

Compound Sentences

A **simple sentence** has one subject and one predicate. A **compound sentence** contains two simple sentences joined by a comma and a word such as *and*, *but*, or *or*.

Simple Sentence The boy helped his mother.

Simple Sentence His mother bought him a bicycle.

Compound Sentence The boy helped his mother, and his mother bought him a bicycle.

The two parts of a compound sentence have ideas that make sense together. A comma goes after the first sentence, before the word *and*, *but*, or *or*.
