

Paraphrasing

When you take notes on facts in a book or article, you **paraphrase** the article. When you paraphrase, choose the most important facts and restate them in your own words.

- Paraphrase only the main ideas, not unimportant details. Make sure you paraphrase the facts correctly.
- Use your own words, not the words and word order used by the author.
- If a phrase or sentence is especially interesting, write it in quotation marks.

Includes main ideas Omits important information Follows original wording too closely
